From the Rev. Timothy H. Graham, Rector

Greetings, dear friends,

When this article reaches you, we will be well into the season of Lent. This penitential season is a time when we are invited to develop a habit of prayer, fasting, and self-denial. Many of you have probably chosen some sort of fast to keep during Lent. I hope that you will also find ways to add into your routine a daily habit of prayer. Self-denial means simply putting God first in our thoughts and actions, above self. Regardless of what type of Lenten discipline we choose, Lent is a time for us to dig deep within our hearts and wrestle with whatever is keeping us from being in a right relationship with God. Then, after that serious and introspective work, make steps to be reconciled to God.

The Curate's Corner

The Rev. Luke Wetzel – *"For almsgiving delivers from death, and it will purge away every sin. Those who perform deeds of charity and of righteousness will have fullness of life."* – Tobit 12:9

One of the traditional Lenten disciplines is almsgiving. To give alms is to give material assistance to the poor. Food, clothes, money, and other necessary things given to those who lack are alms. In my Ash Wednesday sermon I exhorted you to give alms. I was intentionally direct in doing so. I said something like, "take money from your wallet and put it into the hands of someone who needs it." I advised you to withdraw enough cash from your bank account to make you a little uncomfortable and endeavor to continually give it away during Lent.

There is (at least) a two-fold spiritual good in almsgiving. The first "positive" good is that it facilitates the compassionate love of neighbor. Almsgiving helps us grow in

that second-greatest commandment of Jesus, "love your neighbor as yourself." Making a regular practice of giving to those in need helps us grow in compassion for the poor. That we regularly fear or even resent those who ask of us is in fact a sign that almsgiving is good for our souls.

We have to confront our own sin before we can encounter Jesus Christ in the poor (see Matthew 25:31-46).

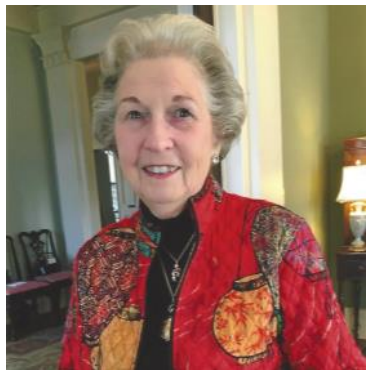
A second "negative" good of almsgiving is that it helps us to love our own material goods a little less. St. Paul famously teaches St. Timothy that "the love of money is the root of all kinds of evil." (1 Tim. 6:10) Jesus tells us that we "cannot serve both God and wealth." (Matt. 6:24). Our material goods call out continually to be loved and served. Money in particular functions as a kind of universal good. It promises to be anything we want it to be, not just concrete things like food or flat screen televisions - but also intangibles like security, joy, even love. We feel compelled to protect it, to help it grow, to use it wisely. It is seldom simple prudence that leads us to seek the best bargain or ideal portfolio, but also our love of money, our fear of having enough. What we call "responsibility" is often a cover for the security, status, joy, or even love that we think our money will bring us through a well-funded retirement, a nice car, or even our charitable giving. Even the ways we scrutinize the money we give away betrays the way in which money captures our imaginations. We seek the greatest bang for our buck in giving to support educational institutions, organizations that serve the poor, even our church. Even our gifts are calculated.

When Jesus told us in our Ash Wednesday reading to not "let your right hand know what your left hand is doing" he was evidently talking about being so discrete in your almsgiving, no one - not even your other hand - is aware of your charity. It also points to the reflexive character of giving that we're meant to cultivate through almsgiving. Give immediately, without calculation, even irresponsibly. This is true of your money, of your food, of your time, and of hospitality in your home. The 13th century Dutch mystic Hadewicjh of Brabant famously received this charge from God at the end of a vision: "give all, for all is yours." What God has personally and generously given each of us - our worldly goods, our bodies and souls, our salvation, a share in the kingdom of heaven - is so extravagant that we are meant to respond in similar personal generosity. This can and should be reflected across the whole of our lives: our worship, our work, our leisure, our family life, and yes, our financial and economic life. The traditional practice of almsgiving puts us in proper relationship both with our goods and with those poor, so loved by Christ, who ask of us.



TRINITY SPOTLIGHT: Get to Know...

Hariot Rogers Lippmann



Hariot was born in Cartersville, Georgia, on a cold, rainy night in April of 1928. As her father was an educator, they moved several times before settling in Macon, Georgia where she received her education. She graduated from A.L. Miller High School (girls only) in 1946 and was a fourth-generation graduate of Mercer University in 1950. While at Mercer, she met a handsome young man through a mutual friend, Gene (as Paul was known growing up) Lippmann. Paul grew up in Columbus, attending St. Elmo and Columbus High School. He served in the Army in Europe during World War II and returned to Columbus after being discharged when the war ended.

While dating in college, they became friends with a young Episcopal priest, Stewart Matthews, who was a big influence on them. Since Paul had been raised in the Catholic church and Hariot in the Baptist church, they were interested in a common ground for their faith. They were confirmed in December of 1950 at St. Paul Episcopal Church in Macon and married there in April of 1950.

After marrying Paul and moving to Columbus, she joined Trinity and has been a member for 68 years! They have both been active in many areas of Trinity. Paul served as President of the adult Sunday School class, as Superintendent of Sunday School, and both as Junior and Senior Warden of the Vestry several times. He also served as an usher and even wrote a guide book for the ushers. Sadly, after 62 years together, Paul died in 2012. He loved Trinity Church and now rests in the columbarium.

Hariot enjoyed being a member of the Lucy Shepherd Guild, serving as President for about 20 years, and is a member of the hand bell choir, Altar Guild, Daughters of the King, and Memorial & Arts Committee. One of her greatest pleasures was writing monthly notes to Trinity shut-ins, and ill and bereaved parishioners. Hariot worked for many years trying to get our library catalogued.

She retired after 30 years as a librarian in the Muscogee County School District. After retirement, Hariot began volunteering at the Columbus Museum in the gift shop on Thursday afternoons. In 2017 she was awarded the Ocie Mae Harris Memorial Award as "Volunteer of the Year" during National Volunteer Week. She is also a member of the Student Club and the Golden Girls Investment Club.

When Hariot is not busy with volunteering and other activities, she enjoys playing bridge with friends, reading, and going to the beach and relaxing.

She is passionate about her family, which includes two lovely daughters, six amazing grandchildren, and seven beautiful great-grandchildren.

For someone *so* active and who looks *so* young, it is hard to believe that Hariot is looking forward to celebrating her 90th birthday in April! We wish her well and give thanks for her many years of service and dedication to Trinity.
